




## Rally Report





# Award Winners

## Senior Citizen of the Year 2024



### **Arthur Fennell**

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## Insurance Problems with Battery Electric Vehicles

**This article** looks at some of the ensuing, and seemingly unpredicted, insurance-related problems that have arisen with the increase in BEVs in the UK. This is not a criticism of BEVs per se, but a highlight of some unexpected consequences identified in recent UK articles on the subject.

According to recent data from the UK's Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders (SMMT), 267,203 of the 1,614,063 new cars registered on UK roads in 2022 were new BEVs (Approx 16.6%), representing a 40.1% sales increase over 2021. This figure will increase over coming years, and whilst this is in line with Government initiatives, the following insurance issues identified will undoubtedly start to slow the take-up of BEVs until technical issues associated with, in particular, the batteries are addressed.

As a result of concerns over significant increases in vehicle insurance costs, the UK's premier automotive risk intelligence company, Thatcham Research, funded by the UK Government's innovation agency (Innovate UK), issued a report in July 2023, entitled: "Impact of BEV Adoption on the Repair and Insurance Sector". This report noted that there was a clear difference as to how BEVs impacted on the Motor Insurance Industry, compared to conventional internal combustion vehicles (ICEs). They examined the BEV repair network and assessed the economic value associated with their adoption in the UK, concluding that no part of the Motor Insurance Claims process was unaffected, and that this will inevitably force a widespread change to the Motor Insurance Industry.

It was predicted that the number of BEV repairs in 2025 would be approximately 0.25 million, rising to 2.0 million in 2040 and then flattening at around 2.25 million per annum thereafter. However, these figures do not include any estimate for write-offs

BEV insurance claims were found to already be around 25% more expensive than their ICE equivalents with repairs taking some 14% longer, due to such factors as:

- Batteries,
- Vehicle Handling,
- Storage,
- Repairs,
- Training, and
- Sustainability.

Due to the reasons outlined below, anecdotally, people who are being paid out against the write-off of their BEV then buy a conventional ICE vehicle.

### **Batteries**

The major component of the repair cost increase was identified with high voltage (HV) battery damage. This is not surprising for as noted in a recent British Government House of Commons Library Report: "Electric vehicles and infrastructure – February 2023" the battery constitutes approximately 40 to 50% of the value of an electric vehicle, with other components in the electric powertrain responsible for a further 20%. The reason is that Lithium-Ion (HV) batteries in electric vehicles can be extremely sensitive to damage, and what might be considered a minor crash incident for a conventional car may lead to a possible battery fire in a BEV, a fire that could in fact burn for days. Since the HV

battery and related systems are generally positioned in the floor of the vehicle's chassis, with mounting points under the side sills, this has been found to leave them prone to collision damage.

Mechanical damage increases likelihood of battery damage by 10%, and underbody damage is 85% more likely to result in battery damage. Whilst accidents that are most likely to involve battery damage are those which cause SRS deployment, damage can also occur through simply dropping hard off a curb, driving at speed over a speed bump, or by hitting a large pothole as BEVs weigh some 300 to 500 kgs more than an equivalent ICE vehicle.

In one study of a BEV Volkswagen, The Thatcham Report noted that the vehicle had been deemed a write-off after an underbody scrape which indented the protective metal plate covering the battery by only 5 mm! No other vehicle damage was evident. Since, as noted above, HV batteries represent a substantial percentage of the original vehicle value, being typically between £14,000 to £29,000, this represents a significant percentage of the vehicle's market value. In some cases, the cost of a replacement HV battery system was found to exceed the market value of the car after only one year, hence another reason for an early write-off.

### **Vehicle Handling**

After a BEV accident, any shock loads or body movement should be minimised as this can exacerbate internal damage to the HV battery system.

BEVs should not be towed on their driven wheels because this can cause regenerative electrical power to be produced, so damaging further the HV systems and safety mechanisms, there having been instances where vehicles such have ignited during handling.

Most agencies recommend that the vehicle be transported on a flat-bed truck or on a trailer, but their handling is not one that break-down drivers relish. When under repair in the workshop, vehicle handling can be further hindered by the design characteristics of that vehicle. For example, some BEVs cannot be moved after the battery has been removed as they are rendered structurally unsound, which naturally severely limits the capacity to undertake a major repair on such a model, resulting again in it probably being written-off.

### **Storage**

Due to the associated risk of fire, the UK Government have introduced guidelines stating that damaged BEVs should be stored in an outside quarantine area 15 metres from other objects, and that assessors are to monitor the fire risk for up to 48 hours after an incident.

It is worth noting that this quarantine separation distance is equivalent to over 3 typical car lengths around the entire damaged vehicle! Repair yards can hardly devote this amount of yard space to the storage of one vehicle without incurring additional storage costs or the loss of general repair business. As a result, this guideline is often not followed, at an occupational safety risk. The storage of damaged BEVs inside a workshop therefore creates major problems which are yet to be adequately addressed by regulators.

The costs to meet such additional external storage requirements alone, has been estimated to rise from a current £650 million per year to £900 million by the year 2040.

### Repairs

It was noted that there is currently no consistent industry diagnosis and repair methodology, resulting again in battery replacement as the go-to solution, even where the damage may appear relatively superficial.

The report notes also that currently only two vehicle manufacturers offer a battery exchange programme, and that a quarter had non-repairable batteries. In fact less than half the manufacturers had repair methods and parts to support their high voltage batteries.

Some other practical issues with BEV workshop repairs include:

- Handling, as discussed above,
- Storage, again as discussed above,
- Increased vehicle weight, and
- Paint booth temperature

That is; subjecting the HV battery to high temperatures can cause damage, with the safe temperature varying across different BEVs, with the Report noting that this information is not always even provided by vehicle manufacturers.

### **Training**

Vehicle damage assessors were noted to currently have very few tools or techniques to sufficiently assess potential HV battery damage. Although The Association of British Insurers' Code of Practice for the Categorisation of Motor Vehicle Salvage provides a framework for assessors, the current reality was found to be that total losses or write-offs were a common outcome of BEV accidents. This trend is then further compounded by the fact that there is a shortage of qualified EV repair mechanics.

The Institute of the Motor Industry stated in January 2023 that only around 16% of technicians in the U.K. had the relevant qualifications to work on electrified vehicles and were concerned over possible ongoing shortages.

It therefore appears that until there is comprehensive manufacturer repair and battery training programme for the industry, that such repairs will only be performed within that specific Manufacturer's dealer network, again impacting on costs.

#### **Sustainability**

Clearly writing off current cars due to present difficulties in their assessment and repair, poor design and the lack of parts, is unsustainable, even in the short term.

Whilst current electric vehicle batteries may have a predicted lifespan of well over 100,000 miles (160,000km), in reality the range is reduced due to battery degradation factors as:

- Driver patterns (e.g., aggression),
- Climate (e.g., extreme temperatures)

- Overcharging (continued charging on a fully charged cell),
- Deep discharging (when the battery's capacity has been exhausted),
- Charging with a high charge rate,
- · Corrosion, and
- Storing with a full state of charge.

It has been estimated that, for the UK, there would be around 260,000 damaged batteries per year in 2035, rising to around 360,000 per year by 2050. Hence sustainable programmes need to be developed, but currently there is a lack of any viable battery salvage system to help mitigate costs. Most current techniques involve the processing of shredded battery packs to produce a homogeneous toxic mixture known as 'Black Mass' containing lithium, manganese, cobalt, graphite, steel, and nickel etc... which must then undergo further processing in order to extract the elements.

Whilst battery repair is the most sustainable option, it is not always technically viable and, as noted, most current vehicle manufacturers do not have any parts or procedures for such repairs.

The demand for precious metals essential in the production of EV batteries is ever increasing, hence concerns over some mining practices and the efficiency of extraction needs to be addressed.

Alternatives to Lithium-Ion batteries are currently being researched, hence their long-term effect on the industries' sustainability is unknown.

### Conclusion

All the above factors naturally result in higher insurance premiums. Further they render the developing second-hand BEV market as uncertain and hinder new BEV take up as motorists grapple with the uncertainties of owning and maintaining an electric vehicle, especially given the likelihood of total loss following any collision.

Insurance and repair costs were estimated at currently £600 million per year, and as more battery-powered vehicles take to the road this amount will naturally increase.

In their conclusion, <u>Thatcham Research</u> stated that they believed these challenges were not insurmountable given appropriate action and cooperation, between Government, vehicle manufacturers, insurers, repairers, training, and recyclers.

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
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
